



# Good Practice Requirements

Lotterywest is committed to maximising the positive impact of our grants for the WA community. Our Good Practice Requirements apply to all grant requests received from 1 January 2024.

Our team are here to help you think about what you need in order to meet these requirements. This includes considering any costs associated with addressing the requirements as part of your grant.

It is always good practice to engage with those who will benefit from, or be affected by, your initiative to make sure you are considering their needs and maximising impact.

Want to level up your impact? We've included a range of additional suggestions and helpful information for you to consider.

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# Respecting Aboriginal peoples



- Engage with Aboriginal peoples when initiatives affect them and their communities.
- Include a Welcome to Country and/or an Acknowledgement of Country at your event.

#### You could also consider

- · Acknowledging Country in digital or written content.
- Dual naming for places and buildings.

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# Equity, diversity, and inclusion



## You are required to

- Treat all people equitably with respect and dignity,
  regardless of gender and sexual identity, ability,
  language, ethnicity, religious belief, cultural background,
  age, education, socioeconomic background or other
  dimensions of diversity.
- Address relevant access needs including parking and facilities to help those with particular needs and promote relevant information about these issues in advance.
- Ensure that any promotional materials for your initiative are clear and appropriate for your audience.

#### ) You could also consider

- Providing information in languages other than English.
- Providing Auslan interpreter services.
- Applying the <u>Web Content Accessibility Guidelines</u> (WCAG) for digital content.

# Environmental sustainability



## You are required to

- Effectively manage waste, including recyclable and organic materials.
- · Minimise printed promotional material.
- Promote information about available public or active transport options.

#### You could also consider

- Making sure that any merchandise provided is sustainable and/or re-usable.
- Managing energy and emissions in your venues, facilities or events.
- Being water sensitive in your venues, facilities or events.
- Promoting sustainable behaviours in your venues, facilities or events.

- Make sure you comply with <u>WA's Plan for Plastics</u> which has phased bans of single-use plastics.
- See <u>Waste Sorted</u> for information on managing waste.
- Consider connecting with <u>Containers for Change</u> to recycle 10¢ drink containers and earn extra income for your cause.
- Help your patrons <u>plan their journey</u> by public transport.
- Calculate your carbon footprint with a <u>carbon calculator</u>.

# Healthy lifestyles



#### You are required to

- Make healthy options available if food and drinks are provided or sold.
- · Provide free drinking water or refill options.
- Avoid providing unhealthy food/drink (or vouchers for the same) as a prize or award.
- Refrain from promotions that encourage the rapid consumption of alcohol, glamorise getting drunk or imply that getting drunk is desirable.

#### You could also consider

- Completing the free <u>Fuel to Go & Play</u> 90-minute online community venue training.
- Using vendors from the <u>Healthier Vendor Guide</u>.
- The non-display of sugary drinks by all food vendors/ kiosks/ canteens or in catering.
- Encouraging active transport options (e.g., walking and cycling).
- Incorporating activity in the design of community places and spaces.

- If alcoholic drinks are served, <u>responsible service of</u> <u>alcohol</u> is a legal requirement.

## You are required to

 Provide adequate shade and free sunscreen at all activities and events held outdoors during the day.

#### You could also consider

· Encouraging staff, volunteers and/or participants to wear sun-protective clothes (e.g., long sleeve collared shirts, wide brimmed hats, and sunglasses).

## **Smoke-free**



#### You are required to

· Hold smoke-free events and activities (this includes prohibiting the use of cigarettes, e-cigarettes, vapes and heat sticks products).

Comply with all applicable State and Commonwealth laws relating to the employment or engagement of people who <u>work or volunteer with children</u> (Working with Children Check).

#### ) You could also consider

- Implementing the <u>National Principles for Child Safe</u> <u>Organisations</u>.
- Undertaking a <u>self-assessment</u> to reflect on your current child safe practices and identify areas for improvement.
- Including the <u>National Principles for Child Safe</u>
  <u>Organisations e-learning modules</u> in staff and volunteer training.
