Rock Art Education Space to be revitalised with \$345,000 Lotterywest grant

- Mowanjum Aboriginal Art and Culture Centre receives \$345,000 Lotterywest grant
- Funding will support the Centre's redevelopment of its Rock Art Education Space to engage young people, support sharing cultural knowledge, and promote wellbeing
- Premier to officially open Mowanjum Festival, an annual event which attracts thousands of visitors to the Kimberley

Premier Mark McGowan and Josie Farrer MLA, Member for Kimberley today presented a Lotterywest grant of \$345,000 to the Mowanjum Aboriginal Art and Culture Centre in Derby.

The funding will go towards the redevelopment of the Centre's Rock Art Education Space, which will engage children and young people, support the sharing of cultural knowledge and promote social, emotional and environmental wellbeing.

Once complete, visitors will be able to walk through a permanent storytelling cave featuring state-of-the-art interactive displays.

Visitors will also be educated about cultural protocol when visiting cave sites, helping to inform the estimated 200,000 tourists who travel the Gibb River Road each year.

A separate learning space will feature dynamic collections presenting the traditional language, song, dance and traditional storytelling of the Wandjina-Ungud people.

Premier Mark McGowan will tonight officially open the Mowanjum Festival, an annual event which attracts thousands of visitors to the Kimberley.

The festival features traditional dances from the Worrorra, Ngarinyin and Wunambal-Gaambera language groups, collectively known as Wandjina-Ungud people.

"The Kimberley is a vibrant place and it's exciting to see so many visitors flock to Derby for the Mowanjum Festival.

"I am pleased to present the Mowanjum Aboriginal Art and Cultural Centre with a Lotterywest grant for \$345,000, to help develop the Rock Art Education Space.

"This redevelopment will inspire Mowanjum young people to engage more with their local art centre and assist visitors in learning the correct cultural protocol in approaching significant rock art sites.

"I applaud the Mowanjum Aboriginal Art and Culture Centre for their creative and innovative approach to educating the next generation."
